Q: How can I tell if my money tree has root rot?

A: Signs of root rot include yellowing and dropping leaves, a wilting appearance despite the soil being moist, a mushy or discolored trunk base, and a foul odor coming from the soil. The most definitive way to confirm root rot is to carefully unpot the plant and inspect the roots. Healthy roots are firm and white or tan; rotted roots will be dark, mushy, and may smell unpleasant.

Q: Should I fertilize a sick or dying money tree?

A: It's generally not recommended to fertilize a sick or dying money tree. A stressed plant needs to focus its energy on recovery, and adding fertilizer can be too much for its system, potentially worsening the problem. Once the plant shows signs of improvement and new growth, you can reintroduce fertilization, but always use a diluted solution during the active growing season.

Q: How do I deal with pests like spider mites or mealybugs on my money tree?

A: If you spot pests, isolate the affected money tree immediately to prevent spreading. For mild infestations, you can try manually wiping them off with a damp cloth or cotton swab dipped in rubbing alcohol. For more significant infestations, use an insecticidal soap or neem oil spray. Ensure thorough coverage of all plant surfaces, including the undersides of leaves. Repeat treatments as necessary, following product instructions.
